# THE TANGO CAFÉ

Ruben Fuentes had a cracked disc injury that needed physical therapy rehabilitation and he was addressing that through dancing; Kerri Vaughn had been let go from a corporate job near Syracuse and had been living on a 55 acre farm. She had envisioned the farm as her retirement place after she had worked hard to establish it as a Sacred Circle folk dancing community. The two of them met at a dance lesson in Rochester. After several lessons, they were approached by the previous owner, who was ready to move on from running the third floor, 4,000 square foot, 1885 dance floor which had originally been built as a Ballroom. They quickly recognized this as their unique opportunity to bring the joy of dance to everyone in a more urban environment. This was in keeping with Kerri's belief that one does not need a formal background in dance - merely willingness to have fun in a non-threatening and friendly environment. They both agreed the venture was a chance worth taking...

Kerri at this time had a broad background in many forms of dance having danced since childhood. She had a particular love of Country Line Dancing and Swing. It was because of her frustration with Swing that she discovered Rueda - which is a rich blend of all dancing that features a caller and dancers in community circle groups of pairs performing Salsa - and is a signature dance lesson at The Tango Café. Other signatures include what many consider being the best hardwood dance floor in Rochester, all under beautiful exposed all natural timber wood roof trusses and lit by oversized windows by day, and subtle lighting in the evening.

The two want all to know that you do not have to come in with a partner. Nor is this a club environment - it is a beginner friendly social dance school. Their best clientele are those that come in with a question along the lines of "That looks like fun! How do I do that?" Their best clientele are those that come in and want to understand the music, not merely memorize some formulae that so many instructors teach. You may engage in one on one, in couples, or in group dance instruction. This is a studio that keeps its

clients' needs first and is ready to discuss any of your custom needs and ideas.

And once you've acquired the basic skills to hold your own, this is a place to comfortably and confidently practice your moves for the real world. Adds Kerri knowingly "A move is not yours until you dance it in the wild."

When the downstairs café that used to house The Mez became available, their vision was complete. Now you can have a night out in your own neighborhood with dancing, dessert, and unlimited smiles for \$20 a couple. Light fare is available including soups, salads, and light sandwiches. There is no fryer in sight. Kerri bags her own blend of teas. The wine and beer license will be issued shortly. The decoration is Kerri's and General Manager Orlando's. Their supplier is mostly Craig's List. The newly installed flagstone and large Gregory Street windows are landlord John Trickley's (who had earlier demonstrated his commitment as a ballroom believer by stripping the third floor trusses of their many layers of paint). Their current events are many (visit [www.tangocafedance.com/](http://www.tangocafedance.com/)) and include Theme Nights, Songwriters in the Round, a second and fourth Sunday Latin Jam Session, and an opportunity to experience Rochester's premier Salsa Band live featuring conductor Victor Antonetti Sr.

The Tango is also fortunate to have a Highland Park neighbor on its teaching staff. Anna Rynski lives with her family here and teaches the high energy dance of Zumba at The Café.

# New to the Neighborhood: A Traffic Calming Team

As a result of the September Meeting on Safety and Security, a group of neighbors came together to form a Traffic Calming Team. Our first areas of focus: Linden and Meigs Streets around Ellwanger and Barry Park and also Goodman Street. The playground is so popular with young families that it can be viewed as "The Heart of the Neighborhood". So when the team created its first list of priorities, ensuring the safety of children going to and from this park got the top rank. Right behind on the list is the task of researching and working with the City on ways to create safer crossings on Goodman Street. But while discussing these hot-spots, we realized that our initiative needed an even broader focus towards building a modern culture of respect for pedestrian and non-vehicular transportation within our neighborhood, the surrounding area and the city at large. As stated in our goals statement, we want our neighborhood to eventually rival the best among "walking-friendly" communities across the United States.

With weeks of research in hand\*\*, on November 12th, members of the Traffic Team met with the South East Quadrant Team, and other City officials to begin a new process and a new dialogue on traffic calming. We presented our goals, concerns, preliminary research, and possible engineering solutions. The city officials were very attentive to our concerns and are more than willing to work with us. (Thank you to Peter Saxe, SE NSC Administrator, for organizing this very helpful meeting.) The presentation that we shared with city officials is online at our news blog site ([www.buzzblastandblog.co](http://www.buzzblastandblog.co)) so that anyone interested in this topic can examine it. As we continue to articulate our concerns, plans and solutions, we will always share such important documents on our websites.

While it will take time, the process has started for developing solutions. City transportation has sent us a detailed response regarding engineering changes. The RPD has spent time monitoring speeds of drivers in areas of concern. Our team has compiled a list of desired educational materials to start a resource library. We have found that some of our suggestions for possible solutions are currently out of the control of the City. For example, in order to lower speed limits around the playground to match that of schools we will need a change in state law. Look for details soon on how you can join our efforts to make that change happen.

In fact, for the initiative to be successful, we'll need your input, advice and support. Send us your traffic concerns in as much detail as possible (See Debra Lewis's letter in our online document as an example!) On February 23, 2010 at 7 pm, we will have an open team meeting to discuss implementing solutions and other issues at the NSC Office at 846 South Clinton Ave. Please come and participate!


