## A Healthy Middle Neighborhood

The Highland Park Neighborhood Association requires a clear and realistic description as to why residents move into the neighborhood and why they invest their time and money in maintaining their homes and contributing to the community. It is important to be able to communicate to others, as well as to have an understanding ourselves, as to why we want to live here.

Homeowners want to protect their investment and ensure the attributes of their community are valued by others. Healthy neighborhoods contribute to healthy cities. When accommodations are requested we also need to understand what attributes of the neighborhood need to be sustained to ensure a continuation of our quality of life and what kind of compromises will enhance not detract from our area.

David Boehike, is author and a proponent of a “healthy neighborhoods” philosophy. His ideas have been successfully applied in a number of urban areas. A “healthy neighborhood” according to Boehike is one in which residents “build home equity and strengthen the social fabric of the community.” He calls these neighborhood “middle neighborhoods,” because of the affordability and desirability of their older homes. He believes Americans have choices. The “unique assets and amenities of an older area, its affordability, and evidence of a civic pride which connects people, generates personal investment. These attributes help predict the “sustainability” of a neighborhood.”

The Highland Park Neighborhood is a “middle neighborhood” because it consists of a mix of working people across professions. The population cannot be type cast in respect to age, ethnicity, or race. Homes built in the mid nineteenth century for workers at the Ellwanger—Barry Nursery co—exist with the early 20th century real estate sold by owners of this famous nursery (who donated land that is now Highland Park to the city of Rochester). Our neighborhood sustains the historic connections so necessary to the sustainability of our neighborhood.

Highland Park, local gardens, and a well maintained playground contribute to the much appreciated green space which residents value. People sit on their front porches during the spring and summer and engage with neighbors walking by. The ability to walk to work and stores from one’s home has become a marketable attribute for homebuyers since the 1990’s. Institutions such as the University of Rochester and Colgate Divinity School, in addition to hospitals, a nursing home, schools and early childhood centers are within walking distance of the neighborhood. Stores , restaurants, bakeries, laundries and a movie theatre are accessible from a majority of homes without needing to drive.

The Highland Park Neighborhood Association would like residents to become informed about the characteristics that contribute to our community in order to sustain and enhance the attributes that make our area a “healthy middle neighborhood.”



## Who Is Who In the Neighborhood? Meet Michael Thompson

## Urban Village Scooters

It was a very cold January day when I walked into the best scooter shop in Rochester to chat with owner Kurt Schweitzer about Urban Village Scooters. As a two wheeled vehicle enthusiast myself, I was eager to learn more about the scooter life-style!

Kurt is originally from Michigan and came to Rochester (for the warmer weather) after earning his Electrical Engineering degree at Case Western to work at Taylor Instruments. From Taylor he moved on to Xerox where he did both electrical and software engineering. In 1994, he left Xerox to engage in freelance work.

Motorcycles had always been an interest, so in 2006 Kurt took the Motorcycle Safety Foundation course offered every season at MCC. Upon passing the MSF course, NYS issues the rider his or her motorcycle endorsement. It did not take long for Kurt to discover that which all motorcycle riders know all too well—motorcycles are **Not** a way to save money! When a friend suggested he consider a scooter from a Long Island shop, he recalls returning to Rochester and declaring “If those guys can make money selling scooters, so can I.” He entered the South Wedge Planning Committee’s business planning contest and won. In March of the following year, 2007, he opened his current location at 700 South Clinton Avenue. Kurt never did buy that motorcycle, but today he owns three scooters. He commutes daily on no more than one scooter at a time, in season. There are some stipulations, of course.

Rain is OK, cold rain is not. He is not fond of how snow on his face shield hampers visibility either. He does have some hard core customers though, including winter riders, and one who has only a scooter with bus backup (you know who you are)!



Urban Village Scooters is not only about the bikes though. The scooter lifestyle is the other half of the UVS experience. Soon, one corner of the store will be used to benefit The Negative Image Scooter Club, a club that Kurt is a member of. Its membership includes one family with three generations (!) of riders; lawyers, construction workers, father/son, mother/daughter, a sword swallower, and two city councilmen; its oldest member is in his 70’s. From about mid March until November, the group takes weekly Wednesday evening rides, usually stopping for ice cream. They also have poker runs and campouts. The lifestyle is a “scooter thing” that includes being laid back and unhurried, as well as having a self deprecating humor about the central fact that if it’s not fun, why do it?

UVS is entering its third summer this year. As you might imagine, this is the slow season, so this is deal season! Of course, the best deal is to win the 2009 Buddy50 (available in Seafoam, Powder Blue (pictured), Black, Red, Tangerine, or Pink) in The Highland Park Neighborhood’s Great Scooter Raffle. Your ticket, if it does not win, is also a \$50 off coupon on a new scooter. In addition, UVS will donate \$50 to HPNA! Interest rates are low, and 10% of your down payment is knocked off the price too! Orders are currently accepted for the 2009 models. Kurt is very enthusiastic about the Genuine lineup of scooters, maker of the Buddy50, as they have superior build quality and customer support.

All scooters require a valid driver’s license and helmet with eye protection to operate in NYS. Models like the raffle’s Buddy50 do not require a motorcycle license endorsement. Kurt and members of the club are eager to work with and teach any newbies!

In 2009, Kurt anticipates more festival participation, where he would like to ride his Stella scooter with sidecar. He plans to maintain a larger inventory of in stock bikes. The UVS website will bring you up to date on new events and also features a blog. John Mooney was brought in last year as head mechanic and will repair all makes at a very reasonable hourly rate. When you stop by, tell ‘em you are from The Highland Park Neighborhood!

### A Sigh of Relief

I spent so much energy this summer worrying. The kindergarten topic planted itself in my brain around January and did not go away. Once I knew which school Sophia would be attending, I worried about the program and the teacher and the other kids. I worried about her having the stamina to last the entire day. But mostly I worried about Sophia having a great first experience at “big girl school.” This first experience sets the tone for how she will think about school – and it’s a very big deal. Well, as it turns out I worried for nothing. From day one Sophia has loved going to school and it’s eased my mind considerably. There’s a new energy in my house and I wholeheartedly welcome it.

On an average day (when the wind-chill is not in the negatives), Sophia and I walk the ½ mile up to School #12, with little Aimee in tow. We leave in plenty of time so that we can meander our way to the school, singing, chatting, taking notice of things we never noticed before, or gathering fall leaves for teachers. As we arrive we’re often greeted by hugs: either kindergarten classmates excited to see Sophia, her little sister and “Sophia’s mom”, or Principal Alampi who gives an extra special hug to Aimee too. We stand in the lobby and wait for a kindergarten train to go by so that Sophia can be escorted to her classroom. After Aimee kisses and hugs Sophia repeatedly, we leave Sophia to her to new “big girl” life, we turn around and walk away. No hesitation – not from Sophia and not from me. It’s a great feeling.

The walk home after school is more eventful. It’s filled with the non-focused, energized, chat of a child who’s been challenged socially throughout the day. A child that buys her own milk, packs her own backpack, reads her own books and chooses her own friends. A child who seems to learn a new song every day, has a new best friend every other day, and gets to buy her own lunch once a week.

Comfortable. That’s how she feels now. She has a school that is “her” school and it’s School #12, right up the street.

Who knows what the future holds for school. It’s something I plan to reevaluate each year to ensure that Sophia is getting everything she needs. But as a parent I feel like I can check off a very important milestone: My daughter had a spectacular first school experience.

## NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY Paul Urai

Did you get that new GPS you wanted for Christmas?

If you did great. If you already have one or are thinking about one keep this in mind. Throughout the city GPS units are big targets for criminals breaking into cars. If they see the unit or even just the suction cups, your car may be targeted and your windows broken. Take them inside along with cell phones, laptops and radar detectors. Thieves see them as eye candy and an invitation to break into your vehicle. Always have your key ready and always be aware of your surroundings. Here are some more tips from Ofc. Brian Bannerman Crime Prevention Officer at the NSC Office on South Clinton.

1. Never leave any valuables inside your car. If items must be left in the car secure them in the trunk before you park at your destination. (Never allow would be thieves to observe you locking items in the trunk as they will easily surmise that they must be valuable.)
2. Always park in well lit areas and in view of the public whenever possible.
3. Use an anti theft device such as a club or a visible alarm system when leaving your car parked. These items may deter a thief enough that he chooses an easier target vehicle.
4. Be aware of suspicious activity/persons in parking lots. Call 911 immediately to report crimes or suspicious persons.

## February Meeting: *Our Living History- Reflections of a Neighborhood*

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

I want to invite you and your memories to a special meeting of our Neighborhood Association on February 24, 2009 that we are designing in cooperation with the City Historian called "*Our Living History- Reflections of a Neighborhood.*" We are building a virtual scrapbook out of our resident's anecdotes, photographs and other recollections. It's our way to begin the celebration of the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Rochester. With homes and streets designed in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, our area is especially rich in the heritage of what George Ellwanger once referred to as "The City of Flowers. Many of you may have seen our exhibit last year that chronicled this history as "*The Arboretum that Became a Neighborhood.*" If you didn't, don't worry, we are going to reprise and expand that exhibit this year. Oh yes, the history of the years of Ellwanger & Barry are well documented... *but then what happened?* The answer may well be "*you and your stories.*" That's one focus of our February meeting: to begin a year-long project of sharing stories and living history between neighbors. With your help, we will start a process of collecting the documents, narratives and experiences that define us. One result will be to build an interesting addition to our website and our exhibits, but the real treasures will be discovering special stories and memories from every resident who participates. Do you recall the candy store on Meigs Street? (And do you have a picture?). How many times did Lauterbach's come through with just that hardware item we needed? Did you know that the playground was once the site of the original Ellwanger & Barry School? I have a couple of stories myself; one is about how I bought my current house at a garage sale. And I have a picture to illustrate another special moment. It was taken in 1987 just as I asked my girlfriend to marry me on the rhododendron trail in Highland Park (fortunately she said yes!). I know you have similar tales to tell. What is your favorite of all the movies that played at the Cinema? Who had their first date there? We're interested even if it was last year...memories don't have to be ancient to be special! And if you ever spent a Chinese New Year's with Bobby Shek at the Imperial, did you join the red napkin club? All of these events are worthy to be documented in some way. Remember the year it snowed during the Lilac Festival? I'm sure stories about "our" park are worth a chapter or two all by themselves. Your wedding at the German house with pictures at the park...the neighbors who shared power during the Ice storm....who among you was in the last class at School 24? And who will spill the secrets of the dog-walkers? Whether you've lived in the neighborhood eight months or eighty years, I'm sure you have an experience that we want to record!

As you might gather, this will be a social meeting, so refreshments will be provided. To help with recording your stories and artifacts, we will bring a scanner to capture any photos or clippings that you share. You can also send in your stories by e-mail or bring those to the meeting. And during this special year, we also are interested in recording oral histories by voice recorder and video cam. So if you are willing to participate, come and we will schedule a session. Or record it yourself in the YouTube manner and we will archive it on-site. Even if you are too shy to go on camera, we have other ways that you can participate. As part of our neighborhood scrapbook, we are going to build a series of "Top Five" lists based on neighborhood preferences; for example *the Top Five Businesses We Miss, Top Five Restaurants within walking distance, Favorite Lilacs, The Best Streets to stroll down, Favorite Person out of Rochester's History we'd invite to dinner.* And you can even help us with these categories, as our concept of the neighborhood scrapbook is a work in progress that only starts this February.

We are also going to unveil plans for other special meetings and events throughout the year....including details on how you can join in the fun. And we will discuss how all of this ties in to our plans during the festival season. We are expecting a couple of other surprises for this meeting as the day approaches which will be revealed in our e-mail blast, web-site and blog on facebook.com. I hope to see you there.
