3. Historic District – Bob Thompson

- a. Update on HPNA
 - i. Met with Landmark Society to set benchmarks
 - ii. March they will start surveying neighborhoods (approximately 60 houses a week) to get through the whole neighborhood by May 5th. Surveying means to walk around and make notes on all the properties to evaluate them. Pictures of all homes not needed, but photos of the street, some homes, etc. They have to evaluate every property to give the info to the State.
 - iii. The are establishing a project manager and payment schedule. Payments will be made in approximate thirds. We have some time to make up the \$9,000 we need from the City or Monroe County, Community Foundation, ESL, etc.
 - iv. Will continue to meet on a monthly basis with the Landmark Society

b. Gregory Tract

i. It has been approved by the State and waiting for sign off to be recorded in the Federal Register

ii. 1-2 people applied for the credit and are waiting on the approval from the Fed's to get it on taxes. Stacey reports that a neighbor did get approval.

5. Colgate / Vistas at Highland – Bob Thompson

- a. Preservation Board hearing 2/2/22
- b. 5 zoom meetings and 2 in-person meetings Bob attended with about 100 residents.
- c. City Attorney said they cannot address building height and setback and only can be landscaping and color of the brick. Building height and setback from the street was most of what the community members wrote in with concerns about.
- d. Old dorm buildings with mid-century style are still in disrepair and will remain untouched at present
- e. The site plan was approved again. Developer has not gotten preservation board approval and we need to get more authority from the city to determine what the preservation board is able to comment on.
- f. Most mature trees in the new plan would be gone from the top of the hill.
- g. City Council approved the rezoning of the parcel so the last chance with the neighbor may be through the Preservation Board which is charged with the aesthetics and making sure it fits with the neighborhood. It has always been about the height and the setback from the Highland Parkway. The lawn down to Elmwood is off limits with a conservation easement. But increased the height and lengths of retaining walls for parking lots and will be much more visible from the road.
- h. Evans, Gruber and one other elected official voted against this. At this point only the City Attorney or Mayor will be likely able to make the call about what the Preservation Board is able to speak to.

7. PacTac / PCIC – Report submitted by Larry

- b. PacTac is going to start walking next week (2nd or 3rd week in February) with the community police officer (CPO) of Highland Park.
- c. PCIC and crime in our neighborhood is much better than other areas. Most of ours are grand larceny and burglary and the police officers at the last PCIC mentioned 3 incidents. All three were times vehicles were stolen (one was a car left running while they were in the store, the other two were car keys left in the car and they took the other set of keys from the house).
- d. The RPD is way down in numbers and recruits. By the end of the year, they are going to be down 70 officers in the patrol division alone.
